JOURNEY OF MEDICINAL PLANTS

umans have been close to their environment since beginning of life on earth and used the ingredients to obtain shelter, oxygen, food and medicine. Awareness and application of plants to prepare food and medicines have been realized through trial and

error, observing how apes and other animals utilize plants, spiritual learning by ritual use of medicinal plants in religious ceremonies and meditation. Preserving the oral tradition, knowledge about plants was passed by traditional healers from generation to generation.

What followed next was investigating the activity of crude extracts and active principles, analyzing the chemical structure, synthesis and structural modification (standardization and evaluation) of drugs, hence the emergence of new era of healthcare system to treatment of diseases in the future.

Journey of medicinal plants dates back to one of the oldest science in countries such as India, China, Greece and Egypt. Scripts about medicinal plants date back to almost 5000 years ago in India (a Sumerian clay slab from Nagpur dating back to 5000 years ago was found.), China and Egypt and 2500 years in Greece and Central Asia.

Hippocrates the founder of Greek medicine and Aristotle, pupil of Hippocrates used medicinal plants for treatment of diseases. After them Theophrates, a Greek scientist, founded the school of medicinal plants. Then, Pedanius Dioscorides(1st century AD), a Physician and Surgeon in the years75-45 BC, wrote an encyclopedia, called De Materia Medica, to describe 600 therapeutic medicinal plants in the form of a series of scientific studies on medicinal plants.

Today, according to WHO more than 80% of world population relies more on traditional drugs mainly plants as main source of healthcare. The botanical wisdom accumulated by indigenous people has led to the establishment of the traditional systems of medicine including Chinese, Ayurvedic, Middle eastern, European, African and American.

Some important plants used are basil, ginger, neem, turmeric, aloe, fennel, chives, cilantro, apple mint thyme lemon balm sage, oregano. Home remedies used are turmeric, it has antibiotic properties and is used to heal cuts and wounds. Plants like black pepper, cinnamon, aloe, sandalwood, ginseng, red clover, burdock, bayberry and safflower are used to heal wounds sores, and boils. To reduce fever and the production of heat chiryata, black pepper, sandalwood, and safflower are recommended. Cardamom and coriander are renowned for their appetizing properties. Ginger and cloves are used in certain cough syrups, they are known for their expectorant property, which promotes the thinning and ejection of mucus from lungs trachea and bronchi. Eucalyptus, cardamom, wild cherry are also expectorants. For promoting good blood circulation plants like chamomile, calamus, basil, chrysanthemum, coriander fennel, peppermint spearmint, cinnamon, ginger and turmeric are used. Syzygium cumini is used worldwide against cardiometabolic disorders which include antihyperglycemic, hypolipemiant, anti-inflammatory, cardioprotective and anti-oxidant



activities. More than 30 cardiac glycosides have been isolated from dried foxglove leaves has been used for treatment of congestive heart failure for many decades. Rauwolfia serpentine, the snake root used traditionally to treat insomnia whilst the extracted alkaloid reserpine from rauwolfia roots is used for treatment of high blood pressure. Seeds of horse chestnut, Aesculus hippocastanum have long been used to treat venous disorders like varicose veins.

The recent discovery of anti-neoplastic drug Paclitaxel from Taxus brevifolia (pacific yew tree) stresses role of plants as a continual resource for treatment of medicine. They can dramatically improve, hard to treat illnesses, such as cancer and cardiovascular disease.

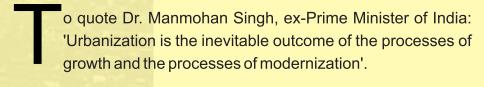
Medicinal plants have a hopeful future since they are about a million plants around the world, most of them have not yet been studied in medical practice hence current and future studies on medicinal activities can be effective in treating diseases.

As billions of people worldwide rely on medicinal plants for health and sustainability, we should do everything possible to preserve biodiversity of our plant ecosystem.

Urbanization is not merely expanding the area of cities, it is a complete change from rural to urban style in terms of industry structure, employment, living environment and social security. These ideas of urbanization have been realized very rapidly in the last two decades. Globally one has witnessed the burgeoning of not just cities but smart cities and the steady exodus of people wanting to occupy them in their quest for a good life.

But everything comes at a price. As has this indefinite growth which is demanding a price from each and every species on this planet. Let us explore how it impacts the very core of our being-i.e. at the level of 'Human Genes'.

Genes are the basic units of inheritance made up of DNA. Any change in the DNA sequence leads to mutation. Changes in even a single base pair can cause dramatic malfunctions. The effect of this can be catastrophic. Mutations can occur in somatic cells - expressed by various diseases in the individual or in germ cells - where the effect is transferred to the progeny and hence affects the next generation.

DNA in any cell can be altered by a number of factors (mutagens):

- a. Environmental factors
- b. Certain chemicals
- c. Spontaneous mutations
- d. Errors during replication

With urbanization and changing lifestyle, the interaction of DNA

with mutagens has increased.

Too far-fetched? Not at all. Don't we all know about the protective ozone layer and its depletion caused due to man-made chemicals? The very chemicals used in airconditioners, refrigerators, inhalers, cleaning of computers and electronics; all the appliances which are integral to urban life. Consequence? Harmful UV rays reach the earth and affect us in unimaginable ways; they can also induce a mutation in skin cells causing basal cell carcinoma. Genetic diseases such as diabetes mellitus and breast cancer find expression due to the urban lifestyle. As the saying goes - "Genes load the gun, life-style pulls the trigger".

Urbanization has also seen women coming to the forefront - getting educated, having lucrative careers and earning their rightful place in society. But modern living has led to an increase in the maternal age which in turn can cause many numerical and structural chromosomal aberrations leading to changes in gene sequence. MODERN MATERIA MEDICA

rbanisation is a sight to behold with its fast-paced movement and flurry of colours. The intense variety of stimuli can be both exciting and overwhelming.

Mankind has surprised itself with the momentum of forward movement it has made in this past century. We have come a long way from scavenging for food, toiling for a few coins and praying to the Gods for shelter. The theme of the moment is to be bigger, better, faster.

The benefits have been monumental. We have, as a race, evolved from surviving to thriving. Produce is plentiful. Data is easy to come by. Societal norms have relaxed and become more inclusive. Entertainment is a standard and no longer a luxury. The changes in the external environment have brought about so many in the internal environment too. The modern Homoeopath now faces the challenge of conceptualising an old Materia Medica with the new presentations.

An area where Materia Medica is seeing a shift is in paediatric prescriptions. With an increase in stimulation at a physical (vibrant colours, catchy music) and an intellectual level (increased syllabi in schools) we are noticing a generation of children who have hyperaware senses. This has led to children developing a rapid rate, perhaps at a pace even they are unable to cope with.

They are very sharp and process things quickly but are often distracted and face difficulties concentrating. They show symptoms of exaggerated physical energy and are paving way to multiple diagnoses of ADHD, Tics, Tourettes etc. Miasmatically we are seeing a definite shift towards the Tubercular miasm and with the need for a different set of drugs.

The spider group has started to come in handy with children becoming more colourful and active. These little performers are joyous and high energy- often too much for their parents. This energy often precipitates in them being destructive and a little too distracted. When this energy fails to be channelized, despite of their extracurricular endeavours, these children precipitate with tics and in rare cases epilepsy.

Children are also becoming incredibly self-aware. With the onslaught of social media consciousness steeping in, they veer towards thinking they deserve to be selfish (Platina), becoming politically proper (Carcinosin) or paranoid by the many evils of the world (Arsenic).

In the adult life, the changing perspective of masculinity and femininity is most apparent.

With the human ideologies shifting the expressions and behaviours are morphing too. No longer are the politically correct Lycopodiums the gruff, macho and dogmatic men of the yore but are now presenting more as sensitive metrosexuals, in touch with their feminine to match the newer understanding of what it is to be a "Man".

The symptoms of mental and emotional stasis are no longer stemming from unfulfilled expectations but from deliberate honing of her intellectual and emotional capacities to become well rounded and balanced individuals. She does still enjoy her dancing though.

She is slowly shifting from her aversion to men and sex into enjoying their company

"Sepia is naturally very feminine, but her femininity is of a special kind, being intuitive, and sensitive to life and the body. She represents one pole of Womanhood, whereas Pulsatilla represents the other, more nurturing, passive pole. It is when Sepia is pressured by her upbringing and her society to deny her own form of femininity that she becomes aggressive, and ultimately may come to hate men."

With modern concepts attempting to equalise genders, the conflicts of former years are slowly dissipating.

There is also an exchange of conventional remedies: we are getting to see more prescriptions of Pulsatilla and sepia for men, where as a large number of Lycopdium and Nux Vomica for women.

Towards the later years, the nuclearization of families is bringing about some distress to the elderly. No longer can they count on the stability of having family members around. Financially, many of them are finding themselves in need and living very frugal lives. This brings about deep insecurity and a sense of being poor. Many of the

elderly are shifting into a phase of "Calcarea Fluorica" where they need to be miserly and worry about expenditure despite working hard throughout their lives. Their constriction and worry often precipitating into thickening of their blood vessels and forming of hardened tumours.

The effects of ageing on their health often lead them to have anxiety. This superadded with the lack physical presence of their family often precipitates in severe anxiety, leading to prescriptions like Calcarea Arsenicosa and Gelsemium or even just Arsenic.

The emotional loneliness has also taken its toll. With their children occupied in their own lives, or shifting to different countries, elderly parents are prone to sadness stemming from lack of love. Added to that, a lot of the younger generation choose not to have their own progeny. This deprives the old ones from the joy of being grandparents. A lot of prescriptions of Acid Phosphoricum (physical prostration and paralysis coming from chronic grief) and Aurum Metallicum (A/F failure to fulfil responsibility e.g. teaching children to take care of their elders; leading to depression).

Overall, modernization has proven that it has solved so many issues of the past but has brought with it, its own imps. The learning for all us would be to nurture a secure inner environment that holds steady in any circumstance. This will allow us to embrace and enjoy newness without the fear of losing ourselves to its charm. The body and mind are indeed your Temples and must be tended with care and love.

disease is no absolute physical entity but a complex intellectual construct, an amalgam of biological state and social definition.- Charles Rosenberg, 1962

Over half of the world's population lives in urban areas and the urban population is increasing by about 2% annually. Over the next three decades, more than two billion people are expected to be added to urban populations. A significant proportion of these will be living in informal or slum settlements. Urbanization presents itself with lots of opportunities and risks, as well as enormous challenges for maintaining and improving human health and wellbeing.

Urban areas are extremely complex environments in which a large number of environmental, social, cultural and economic factors have an impact on individual and population health and wellbeing.

Many organizations such as World Health Organization and others have suggested that time has come to employ new approaches in managing cities, enhancing healthy urbanization, and addressing major health challenges, focusing more on understanding

causes and prevention than on medical intervention and treatment.

Dr. Hahnemann was much ahead of all the contemporary policy makers. He has mentioned in his writings in Organon of Medicine and Chronic diseases about understanding and addressing the cause of disease in curing both acute and chronic diseases. According to him, miasms, being the sole cause of chronic diseases can lie latent and dormant in the human being for years together, but can be triggered into activity by an acute disease or any stressors in the environment. Then to cure or palliate the chronic disease we need to understand the miasm and take care of it by prescribing the indicated Anti-miasmatic remedy.

Urbanization affects human health in several ways, from dietary patterns to the physical environment. The concentration of people in urban areas, with a multitude of economic activity including industrial production and extensive transportation, contributes to air pollution, which is a major health hazard.

Although urbanization allows more accessibility to health services, it also creates health hazards. In poor parts of the cities, health problems include inadequate water and sanitation, limited or no waste disposal and poor air quality, as well as crowded living conditions and general poverty. In such urban areas the air, land and water are often contaminated, spreading disease. In cities in the more affluent parts of the world, health hazards resulting from urbanization are mainly connected to air pollution, as well as

crime, traffic and lifestyle.

Some problems connected to the urban physical environment affect virtually everyone, particularly air pollution. The burning of fossil fuels from transportation, industry and energy production is the main culprit regarding outdoor urban air pollution. Another health hazard common in, but not exclusive to, the cities is connected to lifestyle and consumption patterns, including dietary changes and obesity.

In an urbanized setup, man is exposed to different stressors from the environment. They are physical, emotional, chemical, biological, sociocultural, religious, spiritual, and economic-political objects. These stressors may be the causative modalities or the maintaining causes or the modifiers of the miasm in man.

Thus, whenever the constitution is exposed to these stressors, the miasm in man gets activated and response is generated depending upon the predominant miasm. This phase, we recognize as the phase of the disease.

Each of the chronic miasms has its characteristic signs that are an integral part of the disease and its totality of the symptoms. For example, Psora tends to produce irritation, inflammation, and hypersensitivity; Sycosis infiltrations, indurations, and overgrowth. Pseudopsora tends toward tubercles, fibrosis, and suppuration; Syphilis tends toward destruction, granulation, degeneration, and ulceration. The miasm are present in the very symptomatology of the patient. The syndromes produced by

the miasms point to the fundamental cause even if it cannot be traced in the case taking to specific etiologic factors.

Urbanization offers the lure of better employment, education, health care, and culture; and they contribute a lot to national economies. However, rapid, unplanned and unsustainable patterns of urbanization are making cities focal points for many emerging environment and health hazards and are responsible for a lot of chronic diseases as well as acute diseases in man.

As homeopathic healthcare providers, we need to understand the effects of urbanization on the human economy and how it activates the miasm in order to successfully manage the diseases arising out of it with homeopathic medicines.

URBANIZATION PATHOLOGY

Urbanization refers to the population shift from rural to urban areas in pursuit of better employment, opportunities, education, lifestyle, comfort etc. It is associated with many challenges leading to a load on the lifestyle like sleep timings and quality, diet and nutrition. 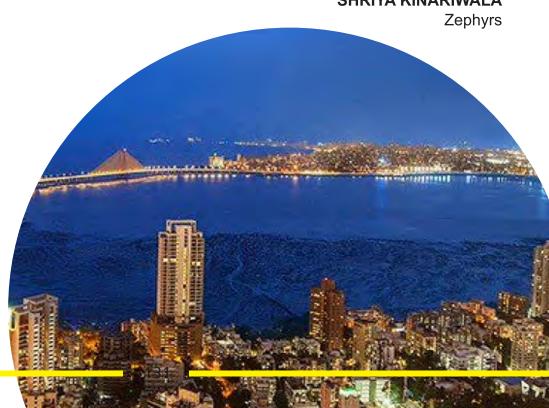

There's certainly something about the city lights that makes sleep futile,

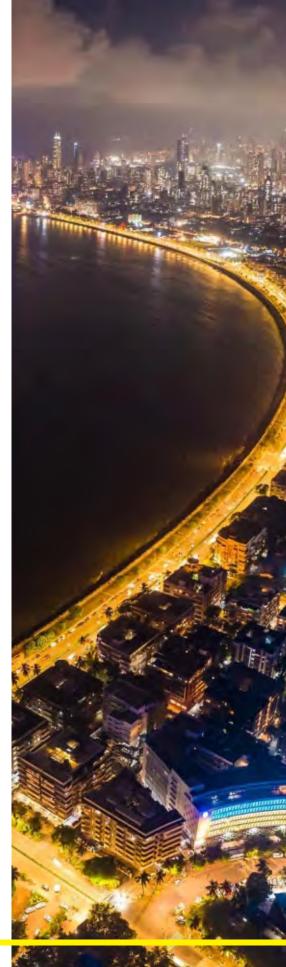
All the struggle had been leading to a beautiful chapter all

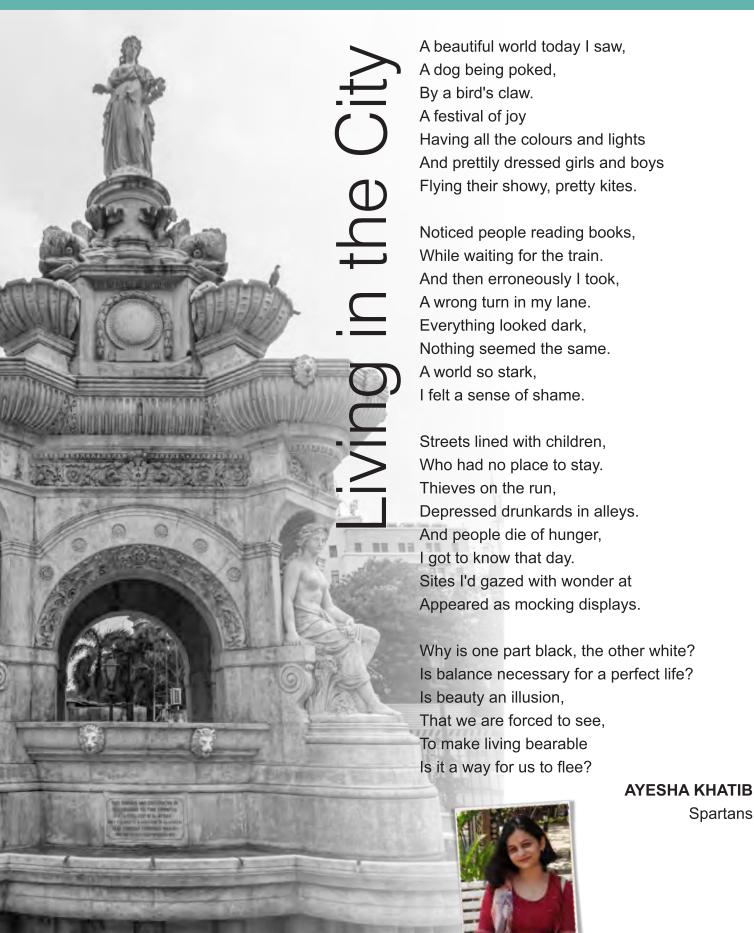

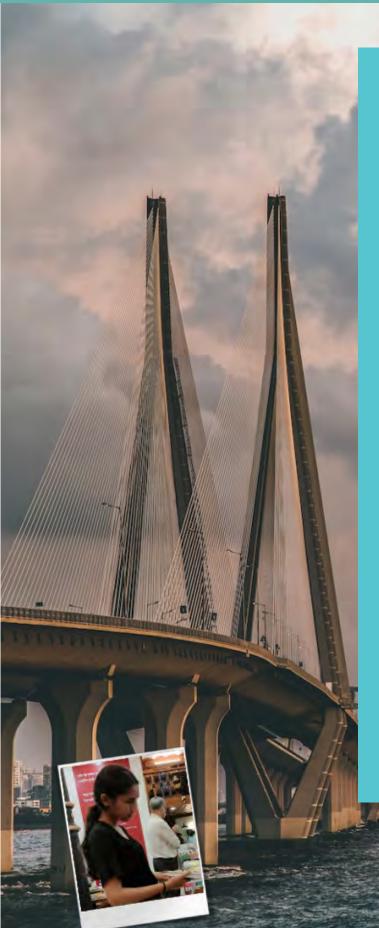

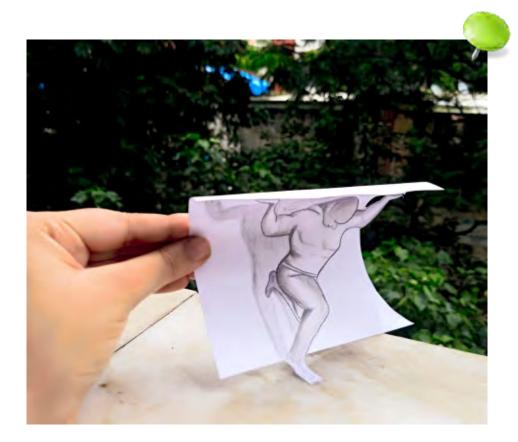
